Author of "Not So Big" philosophy speaks on Wright's inspiration

CHICAGO - Join Sarah Susanka, author of *The Not So Big House*, in a lecture about how architects are inspired and how their designs affect the world around them. Susanka, whose philosophy of building better, not bigger, was inspired by the work of Frank Lloyd Wright, will discuss important aspects of Wright's design principles and their subsequent influence on the architectural field.

Susanka, a bestselling author, architect and cultural visionary, is leading a movement that is redefining the American home. Her "build better, not bigger" approach to residential design has been embraced across the country and her "Not So Big" philosophy has sparked international dialogue.

As a leading advocate for the re-popularization of residential architecture, Susanka has improved the quality of home design while countering the elitist image of architects so commonly held by the public.
